News from Brookside

Spring is in the air, but our horticulture staff have been busy all winter long, making improvements to the Gardens. Here are some of the projects you will see taking place at **Brookside Gardens**:

Bog Garden: Horticulturist Thomas Crawley is expanding the small bog garden he created last year, nearly doubling the display of native carnivorous plants and associated bog plants. This new garden area is located to the south of the Conservatory, across from the boardwalk that leads to the Nature Center.

Crevice Garden: Thomas is also installing a Crevice Garden on the steep bank bed on the north end of the Idea (formerly Trial) Garden. He has carefully placed local Carderock stone to resemble a rocky outcropping that creates a number of planting pockets to hold a variety of drought-tolerant plants.

Fragrance Garden: This year, Horticulturist Keely Shaughnessy highlights fragrant plants used in perfumes. Intern Ashia Bunkley's independent internship project last summer focused on how plants, many already in our collection, are used by the perfume industry to create complex perfumes. Every year, Friends of Brookside Gardens funds two of the four Summer Internship positions.



Rose Garden: Horticulturist Kristin Davey is in the midst of a total planting redesign of the Rose Garden, which includes removing all the roses and associated perennials and grasses, as well as some of the woody plants. The new design features pest and disease resistant rose cultivars, including some lovely heirloom varieties. The roses will be complemented by a variety of perennials and grasses that will extend the bloom season and attract a variety of pollinators. The irrigation system will be changed to a drip system, to save water and eliminate water spray on the leaves. This project is funded in part by a gift from Friends of Brookside Gardens.

Gude Garden: Horticulturist Josh Demers installed 20 new flowering cherry trees between Reflection Terrace and the Viburnum Garden last fall. This little grove of trees will grow into a wonderful feature to give visitors the opportunity to walk through a canopy of blossoms.

Native Azalea Garden: More native azaleas and spring ephemerals have been added to the Native Azalea Garden, near the Ginkgo Canopy, by Horticulturist Jeanette Proudfoot. This project, funded by Friends of Brookside Gardens, highlights the native deciduous and evergreen Rhododendron species native to the eastern United States.

The New Xeric Garden at the Conservatory!!

With climate change happening, we as gardeners wonder about all the changes in the weather patterns and the flora and fauna that are affected by these changes. To answer a myriad of our questions, USDA in November of 2023, has classified our local area as Zone 7b! We are slowly but surely inching our way to a warmer zone. How will this affect how we live and garden and grow crops? While it is certainly a conundrum, we can observe the plants in our garden, pay attention to our water usage and make an informed decision about how to affect environmentally sound changes in how we garden.

The new conservatory manager at Brookside Gardens, *Raymond Carter* is showing us how one can grow plants in an arid climate within the small environs of the North Conservatory. Ray graduated from a Professional Horticulture program at Longwood Gardens in PA and during an internship with the Royal Botanic Gardens in Edinburgh, Scotland, he trained in the management and conservation of critically endangered species. He comes to Brookside after his tenure at Ladew Topiary Gardens in Maryland.

The **Xeric Garden** at Brookside is Ray's brainchild and showcases beautiful cacti, succulents and other exotic species that have low water dependence. Xeriscaping is the process of gardening or landscaping that reduces the need for water dependence in areas where water is in short supply. It shifts the focus away from manicured lawns and flora which have a high dependence on water, fertilizer and pesticides. A xeric garden is a low maintenance garden, featuring drought tolerant plants such as cacti and succulents that may or may not be natives. These plants are thus suited to the specific arid clime and require only a small amount of moisture.

Visitors to Brookside Gardens may remember some of the stalwarts of this xeric Garden – the ponytail or elephant's foot palm (*Beaucarnea recurvata*), the Snake plants (*Sansevieria sps.*), the *Eucalyptus* tree. Now, these plants and their myriad relatives are being showcased in a sparkling xeric garden as soon as you enter the North Conservatory. The Saguaro cactus (Carnegiea gigantea), the Madagascar Palm (*Pachypodium lamerei*), the Golden Barrel cactus (*Echinocactus grusonii*) and the Agave

stand tall and proud and prickly. The smooth, shiny colorful succulents like Sedum, Senecio repens (blue chalksticks), Haworthia cooperi (Cooper's haworthia) (right), and Crassula ovata (Jade plant) resembling alien



creatures stand guard protecting their Martian landscape!! *Euphorbia milii* (Crown of thorns) with its vivid red blooms adds a splash of vibrant color to the verdant hues of this garden. All the plants are from collections at Brookside

Greenhouses or the Conservatory. Some of them are e n d a n g e r e d species that will be protected, propagated and preserved for all to see and enjoy.



Do not miss the bromeliad *Deuterocohnia* brevifolia (**above**), which looks like a big, green, prickly ball. Yes, it is very prickly – so see with your eyes and not with your hands!! There also some amazing succulents in pots that resemble underwater creatures!

The purpose of this new garden is to showcase and conserve many of these plants and to educate the community about the beauty of a xeric garden. Come on over and talk to the conservatory staff to learn about these plants!! Browse through pages 6 and 7 to see these plants through the camera lens of Coriolana Simon and Doug Wolters.

A Professional's View of Brookside: Lee Goodwin

Maryland-based Potomac, fine art photographer Lee Goodwin has been making special trips to Brookside Gardens for many years, capturing the visual flavor of the seasons. He says, "Brookside is one of my favorite places to photograph. I'm really drawn to the variety of subjects and the way they change from season to season." Lee adds, "My favorite subjects are, of course, the flowers. I like the vibrant colors but also the intricate structure of individual flowers." In his photography, Lee often converts flower photographs from color to black and white to emphasize those structures.

Besides the flowers, Lee says, "Brookside is also an excellent place to photograph wildlife – from small insects to great blue herons." He notes that the fragrance garden, in particular, attracts a variety of butterflies. In fact, he says, "In 2020, the garden had an unusually large population of monarch butterflies in addition to the various butterfly species that appear in

different years." To Lee, Brookside offers much more than just flowers and wildlife. He explains: "The Brookside landscape itself is a great subject, especially in the fall."

In spite of his wealth of Brookside images, Lee Goodwin does much more with his cameras. As a professional photographer in the MD / DC / VA areas, he is well known for specializing in wildlife and landscape images. His photographs have been featured in more than a dozen solo exhibits and more than 80 group and juried exhibits. They're also on permanent display in the Maryland House of Delegates office building in Annapolis. The sales of his photographs have raised thousands of dollars for charities such as the C&O Canal Trust, Rachel's House, and Critical Exposure.
