


Aug. 10: Sandra Dean Band brings the house down with interpretations of Classic Rock, Blues,

# **Please Join Us**

25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Tree Dedication Thursday, September 23, 2021 3:00 – 4:00 pm (Rain date September 28) Brookside Gardens Visitor Center, followed by the dedication ceremony Registration (free) via Eventbrite - *information to follow* 

To commemorate the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of **Friends of Brookside Gardens (FOBG)**, **Brookside** Gardens is dedicating a vigorous white oak (*Quercus alba*) tree in honor of our organization. The tree was grown from a **Brookside** seedling planted in the 1960s.

Why dedicate an established tree? Twenty-five years ago, **FOBG** was a seedling organization, founded by a handful of garden lovers who wanted to help **Brookside**. Over the years, our group grew roots and branches in the form of dedicated Board members, volunteers, donors, and members. Today, we have more than 900 members and have raised over \$1.6 million in the past 25 years to support **Brookside** in the form of plantings, lectures, internships, performing arts, and equipment. And, like the tree, we expect to grow larger and stronger in the next 25 years to keep serving the evolving needs of **Brookside Gardens**.

This oak will stand as a symbol of the enduring partnership between **FOBG** and Brookside **Gardens**, and our shared goal of encouraging a love of nature in the community.

# **Garden Guardian**

#### A missive on deer tolerant plants

I'm sure most of us are fenceless and defenseless against hungry browsing deer. It only takes one a short time (usually at night when we're sleeping) to do much damage - often nibbling delectable plants to the ground. How many mornings have we walked outside to check the garden and some of our favorite plants have been had!!!! Yes, there are ways of trying to cope, mainly using deer repellents of one sort or another such as stinky sprays, or placing small containers with stink products near vulnerable plants. This works for a while, but just when things seem good, along comes a rain, and the next morning they're back!! And so, yes, an 8' tall perimeter type fence (plastic netting type is ok) would work, but fencing often needs community clearance, sometimes seems out of place or cumbersome, or just requires too much of it. And even then, deer have been known to 'bust through' or find a break when a tree (limb) falls across it.

Anyway, the point of this article is to suggest using as many deer tolerant plants as possible. Deer tolerant plants are those which deer just don't find palatable. And, yes, there are a range of such plants with some being more deer tolerant than others. Sometimes it just comes down to trial and error in your garden and also depends on how hungry the deer are. For example, actually I've found stronger deer browse pressure in the winter (on conifers even though most are listed as deer tolerant, but not *Chamaecyparis* and the like). With respect to dwarf conifers, I've found it effective to place a thin layer of netting over the plants – works well. Back to deer tolerant plants – there are some guidelines that will help with your selections. The first: deer seem to avoid plants with a strong aroma. There are a number of plants in the mint genre like *Nepeta* (catnip), to *Pycnanthemums* (American mountain mint) or *Agastaches*. I bet deer won't bother most of your herbs!! The second is coarse texture (say, heavy hairiness, or thorns) *like Stachys* (lamb's ears), Chinese rhododendron, cacti, or yucca, etc. And then, there are some plants deer just leave alone (maybe due to bad taste) like boxwoods, daffodils, jack in the pulpits and many irises. There are other plant groups deer tend to avoid, such as ferns and coarse ornamental grasses. I find a few plants tolerate browsing/nipping like azaleas – sort of an 'artful' pruning job. You lose some perimeter flowers, but the shrubs seem to grow back fully.

The point remains, there is a full range of plants that you can use in your garden that will not be devastated by deer. If you have a fair amount of these you can then focus on your 'treasures' using whatever devices you choose. The value of deer tolerant plants is that they shouldn't require special protection. Just plant and enjoy.

There are numerous sources online, in catalogues or books, etc. with many suggestions for deer tolerant plants. The Perennial Farms catalogue annotates each plant with various symbols (say sun tolerance, wetness, etc.) including levels of deer tolerance which they tout as 'deerlirious'!

As a Master Gardener for Howard Co., I sponsor a deer browse trial garden at the entrance to the Alpha Ridge landfill (Marriottsville Road.). Thus, if you have some plants that you've found deer tolerant, I'd be thrilled if you'd let me know. Bear in mind that there are some escapees that are not chewed just because for whatever reasons, deer won't go where they are.
