You, our **FOBG** members and the public have enjoyed **Brookside Gardens** more than ever and now is the time to show your support of this beautiful space by participating in this mutually beneficial fundraiser. We will post the details of this year's plant inventory on our website: www.friendsofbrooksidegardens.org at the end of August. The information on the plants you buy this year will be on our website until May 2023. This is in case you lose the plant tag and want to know that nameless plant (or is it a weed?) that is growing in your garden - like the cheerful bloom on the left which is Echinacea 'Fiery Meadow Mama' from plant sale 2020! We are purchasing fully grown quality plants again for the sale this year. The prices of the plants may be up by a few dollars compared to last year since, just like everything else, plant costs have gone up. However, you can be sure that you will be getting great plants at prices comparable or lower than retail nurseries. People had to wait in long lines last year due to the popularity of the event. Therefore, there will also be other changes to our plant sale – separate lines for smaller vs. larger purchases, credit card transactions through the Square portal and separate lines for cash and checks. We also hope to have larger quantities of plants so that we don't run out (if possible). Although we cannot make everything perfect and everyone happy, we listened to you and will strive to do our best and bring quality perennials for your garden. See you on September 10th!

Garden Guardian

Frenetic Phenology

OK, so we all know about climate change and that it is causing an upward shift in temperatures over the long run. What we want to be thinking about is if we can see any effects on our gardens here in the Washington, D.C. area.

We can start off with casual observations. Does it seem like some plants are appearing or flowering earlier in the season than they used to? For example, it seems to me that crepe myrtles, at least some cultivars, are blooming much earlier – like early July. I can remember times when it was hard to grow crepe myrtles here. They were on the edge of hardiness. Now instead of being pretty much late summer bloomers, you can see some in bloom from July into September. Some of this has to do with breeding, but much is a result of a warmer climate. One might now be saying similar things about camellias – all doing better here whether the spring or fall types (Sasanqua/Japonica). Other observations concern butterflies. It seems to us at home, that in previous years, swallowtail population peak coincided with Liliums. We had swarms of them on our local lilies. But this year, the lilies were almost past before we saw swallowtails, who then seemed to congregate on a hibiscus. So fortunately for them (swallowtails), they are generalists and can survive by feeding on a number of different plants. But consider the impact had they been specialists on lilies! Sometimes, we can see other impacts from shifting dates (changes in phenology). Christmas roses (hellebores) bloomed early only to be caught in a hard freeze and browned out. Maybe if they had started blooming a bit later the worst freezes would have passed. Similarly, we had maple saplings that flushed early only to have their young leaves frozen. One died and the other did flush again later. Point is, it is quite possible to keep an eye on the garden and actually see some things changing – at least in the short term.

Even better, though, than casual observation is note taking and keeping. Wife Freddi keeps notes as to when her epimediums and hostas emerge and flower. Interestingly, one might have expected them to emerge earlier this year. However, counter intuitively, the hostas this year (she showed me data on 18 varieties) bloomed about a week later. Well, that's a fact — maybe we can surmise that for hosta blooming, a cooler and wetter spring/summer trumped over global warming this year.

Well, we could go on with this sort of thing and hopefully you all have observations and notes of your own relating to climate change/global warming. Climate biology is in front of us and likely here to stay. What is soooooo striking about the current pattern is that it is happening at a very fast rate. There have been numerous climate shifts in the past, but most under long enough time periods for organisms to evolve, adapt, move and hopefully survive. The few cataclysmic episodes during geologic times have led to mass extinctions!

If this topic intrigues you, I highly recommend you read: "Hurricane Lizards and Plastic Squid" by Thor Hanson (ISBN: 9781541672420). The title may be quirky but the narrative consists of a fascinating series of pertinent climate change scientific studies. Lots of fun and lots of 'understanding'. Enjoy!
